vulnerable to flooding. The theme of the project is" before the hurricane, before the evacuation, before the traffic, know your zone." Avoiding unnecessary evacuation will reduce traffic congestion, promote highway safety and lessen storm shelter overcrowding. This new plan does not take the place of individual responsibility for storm preparation, and families should have food and water on hand in case they are asked to shelter in place.

Our area zones are from A to D, with Zone A being the most vulnerable to flooding and Zone D the least vulnerable. Go online to <a href="https://www.knowyourownzone.org">www.knowyourownzone.org</a> and type in your address to find out your zone. If you don't have internet access, you can call 211, the State of Virginia information line.
